Mitigating Climate Change GOV. LAMONT SIGNS NEW EXECUTIVE ORDER

September 3, 2019 – Connecticut Governor Ned Lamont signed Executive Order No. 3, which expands on the State's efforts to mitigate climate change and improve resiliency as we face rising sea levels and increasingly powerful storms.

The Executive Order:

- Expands the scope and responsibility of the Governor's Council on Climate Change, to include monitoring and reporting on the state's development and implementation of adaptation strategies.
- Allows the Council to establish Climate Change Mitigation and Climate Change Adaptation and Resiliency Subcomittees.
- Calls for oversight of the state's climate mitigation progress.
- Outlines specific tasks for oversight of the state's climate change adaptation and resiliency strategies.
- Asks the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) to recommend strategies for achieving 100% zero carbon for the electric sector by 2040.

DEEP Commissioner Katie Dykes said, "Governor Lamont's actions today cement Connecticut's commitment to urgent action on climate change ... By signing this executive order, Governor Lamont ensures Connecticut will have tools to plan for and address impacts like sea level rise and flooding, extreme heat events, and changes to ecosystems and habitats throughout the state. By incorporating resilience into our planning practices, and charting a path to a 100 percent clean electric grid, we can provide safety and security for future generations."
